Interviews

Elite athletes will be available for interviews on Friday, October 9, following the 10:30 a.m. press conference. Please submit any specific interview requests to the media relations team prior to the Friday press conference to confirm time with athletes.

Additionally, each elite athlete will be made available for one hour in the press room for small cluster interviews and one-on-ones on Thursday afternoon, October 8; Friday afternoon, October 9; and Saturday morning, October 10. The schedule of appearances will be distributed race week.

Interviews will not be permitted at the start or finish lines on race day with any media outlet except official event broadcast partners. The men's and women's champions, other top finishers, and Executive Race Director Carey Pinkowski will be available to the media following the race in the media center.

Race day services

- The NBC 5 broadcast will air live in the media center on race day from 7 to 11 a.m.
- Direct video feeds of the men's and women's races will accompany the live broadcast in the media center to provide complete, uninterrupted coverage of both races.
- A web link will be provided to track the leaders during the race. The tracking website will include a race leader board, as well as mile and 5K split times for the race leaders.
- Printouts of split times will be provided to working media throughout the race, and official race results will be distributed shortly after the completion of the race.
- The top three finishers in both the men's and women's races will address the media in the media center following the completion of the race. Additional interviews with athletes will be available upon request. Please submit those requests to the media relations team before the finish of the race.
- On race day, Executive Race Director Carey Pinkowski will offer a brief address at approximately 11:30 a.m. in the media center. At 2:30 p.m. both Pinkowski and Medical Director Dr. George Chiampas will offer a report of the day's events and be available for questions from the media.

Top storylines

2015 Marathon Brings World's Olympic Hopefuls

Leading into an Olympic year, the Bank of America Chicago Marathon will play a major role on the "Road to Rio" for international elites. Many athletes hope that qualifying times and notable performances in Chicago will get them one step closer to representing their countries at the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympic Games.

Headlining the elite field are 2012 champion Tsegaye Kebede of Ethiopia and current half marathon world record-holder Florence Kiplagat of Kenya. As Kebede was not selected for Ethiopia's 2012 Olympic Team, a win at the Chicago Marathon could help his chances of making the 2016 team. Kiplagat has not yet represented Kenya at the Olympics.

Americans hoping to test their current training on the streets of Chicago in an effort to get one step closer to making Team USA are Fernando Cabada (CA), Sean Keveren (VA), Blake Russell (CA), Sarah Crouch (NC), Sara Hall (AZ), and Chicagoan Tera Moody.

America's top professional runners will attempt to earn their spot on Team USA at the 2016 U.S. Olympic Marathon Trials in Los Angeles on February 13.

American Athletes Vie for Spot at 2016 Paralympic Games

On October 11, the 2016 U.S. Paralympic Team Trials Marathon will be held on the streets of Chicago. Top wheelchair athletes from around the country will race in the event's professional wheelchair field to secure one of four spots on the 2016 U.S. Paralympic Team.

Current Chicago Marathon champions Tatyana McFadden and Josh George, both training at the University of Illinois, will headline the American elite field. Joining George and McFadden are fourteen University of Illinois athletes, including previous Chicago Marathon champion Amanda McGrory and the program's head coach, Adam Bleakney.

Elite athletes will simultaneously be competing in the first Chicago-New York Challenge which will serve as a prelude to the inaugural Abbott World Marathon Majors Wheelchair Series beginning with the Boston Marathon in April 2016.

Joan Benoit Samuelson and Deena Kastor Return to Chicago

Legendary runners Joan Benoit Samuelson and Deena Kastor return to the event on the anniversaries of their Chicago wins. Samuelson returns 30 years after the 1985 Chicago Marathon, a race in which she outran a world record holder and the defending Chicago Marathon champion. She broke the tape in 2:21:21, a new course- and American-record. On October 11, Samuelson will toe the start line with the goal of finishing the race within 30 minutes of her 1985 time.

Deena Kastor will arrive in Chicago 10 years after her 2005 Chicago Marathon victory, and seven years after breaking the American record Samuelson set in 1985. In another record-breaking attempt, Kastor will run Chicago to challenge the current women's American Masters record (2:28:40), set in Chicago in 2005 by Colleen DeReuk.

Chicago Marathon's Hometown Impact

With more than 40,000 participants coming from 50 states, and more than 130 countries, the Chicago Marathon brings an estimated \$254 million in total business impact to the City of Chicago. This information is presented in a study conducted by the University of Illinois. The study also found that each

dollar spent by a race participant generated an additional \$1.27 worth of activity distributed throughout Chicago.

2014 Charity Runners Set Record Numbers

At last year's Chicago Marathon, more than 10,000 participants ran on behalf of a charity. These runners brought in an event record of \$17.7 million for local, national and international causes. Since the charity program's beginning in 2002, Chicago Marathon participants have raised more than \$132 million for these causes.

Hillary Gelfman was one of the charity runners at last year's event. In August, she became the fifth recipient of the Richard M. Daley and Maggie Daley Award which honors the participant who raised the most funds for charity. Gelfman ran for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society's "Team in Training" after losing her sister to Leukemia in the fall of 2014. In total, Gelfman raised more than \$90,000.

Behind the Scenes: Medical, Technological Advancements

As Medical Director of the Bank of America Chicago Marathon, Dr. George Chiampas oversees medical and technological advancements used by the event to optimize runner and spectator safety. This year, Dr. Chiampas will have access to a new system of data visualization designed by Northwestern University engineering students.

With his assistance and a grant from the National Scientific Foundation, engineers were able to create the data visualization system which will streamline data from various areas on the course (medical, weather, resources, etc.) to help race organizers to act based on incoming information.

Thanks to these engineers and their data analytics, Chicago organizers already know what the first 20 minutes of the 2015 race will look like. What this system will now be able to predict is exactly what will be needed on course at any given time, in any given temperature — from the exact number of blisters runners will seek treatment for to how many gallons of water are needed at aid station #7 on a 67 degree day.

Notable Runners

A few familiar faces will highlight the Bank of America Chicago Marathon course this year. Entrepreneur and television personality Bill Rancic will return to race his hometown marathon after previously completing the Chicago Marathon in 1999 and 2001.

Former Chicago Bears linebacker, Hunter Hillenmeyer, will make his marathon debut here in Chicago. Hillenmeyer will join Chicago Marathon charity runners in raising money for a cause. At this year's race, he will run on behalf of the American Cancer Society.

Joining Rancic and Hillenmeyer is five-time Chicago Marathon finisher, Dave Beran. Beran is the executive chef of Next, a restaurant in Chicago's Fulton Market district, famed for its approach to modern cuisine. In 2012, the restaurant received a James Beard award under Beran's leadership for Best New Restaurant in America.

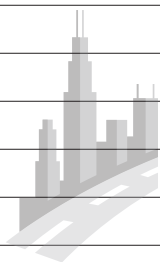
